Context: John T. Gorman Foundation

- A private foundation headquartered in Portland, Maine.
- Our mission: to advance ideas and opportunities to improve the lives of disadvantaged Mainers
- Annual grantmaking: approximately \$7.5mm
- Support strategies aimed at achieving population level results for children, families and vulnerable older youth

Our Priority Areas









Washington County, Maine

- Home to 32,000 people, including 3,600 members of the Passamaquoddy Tribe
- Industry is primarily natural-resource based, seasonal and physically taxing (i.e., marine fisheries, logging, and blueberry harvesting)
- Extremely rural with poverty rates at 20% and child poverty recently exceeding 30%
- Lowest educational attainment rates (28.5% vs 37.5% statewide, associates' or higher)



History: Family Futures Downeast

2012: A group of stakeholders in Washington County identified barriers faced by residents trying to break out of the cycle of intergenerational poverty

Lack of educational and employment opportunities

Lack of aspiration, confidence and self worth

Practical challenges (childcare, transportation, etc.)

Higher education represents a pathway out of poverty, but requires supports and resources to break through these barriers

- post-secondary education
- Co-located, high-quality child care
- workforce skills and opportunities
- access to community resources
- whole-family services
- relationships that change outcomes
