

Since 2013, the Pascale Sykes Foundation has implemented the Whole Family Approach in 14 different collaborative nonprofit organizations across southern New Jersey. The Whole Family Approach focuses on supporting families with two dependable adult caregivers through individualized goal setting, organizational collaboration, and consistent personal supports to families.

The Senator Walter Rand Institute for Public Affairs (WRI) has evaluated outcomes and processes related to the Whole Family Approach since its inception through a quasi-experimental, mixed-methods evaluation. WRI's outcomes evaluation implements validated social science scales to measure changes in three major outcome areas across families: 1) child well-being, 2) healthy relationships, and 3) financial well-being. The process evaluation assesses changes in service provision and organizational partnership among the collaboratives implementing the Whole Family Approach.





OUTCOMES



WRI's most recent analysis indicate several notable results:

Help Given and Received

The Help Given and Received scale measures adult caregivers' self-reported sense of reciprocity in family responsibilities. In target families, Adult 1 scores significantly improved over time, and were significantly higher than matching families' scores throughout the intervention, while Adult 2's scores also significantly improved over time. The results indicate an increase in family duties shared between caregivers related to Whole Family Approach methods.

Child Educational Aspirations

The Child Educational Aspirations scale measures adult caregivers' perceptions of their child's educational aspirations. In target families, Adult 1's educational aspiration scale scores increased significantly throughout the evaluation. The results illustrate a positive impact on educational goals influenced through potential aspects of the Whole Family Approach.

Financial Challenges

The Financial Challenges scale measures adult caregivers' self-reported financial stressors experienced throughout the evaluation. In target families, Adult 2 scores reported significantly fewer financial stressors over time compared to Adult 2 in matching families. The results highlight the potential role of the Whole Family Approach in reduction of financial stressors.

PROCESS

Since 2018, WRI has evaluated specific collaborative processes through both direct observations of collaboratives' monthly planning meetings and focus groups with collaborative staff members. WRI analyzed the data to identify common themes across and within collaboratives implementing the Whole Family Approach.

Through this analysis, WRI identified several cogent themes across all collaboratives:

- Internal Processes: Collaboratives seek to reflect the diversity and culture of their communities, actively use data, and plan for the future.
- Education: Collaborative programming includes college preparatory programs, youth educational opportunities, English as a Second Language classes, financial literacy education, and mental health supports.
- Community Development:
 Collaboratives emphasize trust
 building between themselves and the
 community and develop relationships
 to support current systems and
 enhance community capacity.
- Family: Strengthening family ties is critical to collaboratives' work. They accomplish this through individual goal-setting and involvement in community activities.

EVALUATION



Adaptability

Collaborative nonprofit agencies implementing the Whole Family Approach apply its strategy across a variety of contexts. Collaboratives serve a diverse set of families, including immigrant families, foster youth and their families, families living in poverty, families with unrelated caregivers committed to engagement in a child's life, and families who aim to help their children thrive. WRI's evaluation illustrates how the Whole Family Approach integrates the flexibility necessary to be successfully implemented across organizations with numerous goals in a variety of contexts.

Ongoing Evaluation

WRI will continue to engage in inter-collaborative outcomes and process evaluation. In addition, WRI has committed to identify changes overtime in outcomes and process within individual collaboratives operating with specific goals and in various, and often dissimilar, contexts. Future evaluation will focus on educational framework programming, the cultural responsiveness of the approach for immigrant families, and effective goalsetting and supports in individual and group settings. WRI will continue the Whole Family Approach evaluation through June 2022.
